a message from pastor brent



One of my favorite Bible stories is Jesus' healing of the paralytic in Luke 5. In a nutshell, four friends take their paralyzed friend to see Jesus in the hope that he would be healed. The home where Jesus is teaching is so crowded that the friends carry their friend up to the roof of the home, remove some roof tiles, and lower their friend, who is on a stretcher, through the roof, and he is healed by Jesus. One of the lessons from the healing of the paralytic, is that we, the Church, are called to go to considerable lengths to make God's healing love available to all.

At Zion we do so in a number of ways:

- Hearing devices are available at the sound booth for those who may be hearing impaired. If you would like to try one of the hearing devices, just stop at the sound booth at the back of the church before the service and our sound staff will be happy to provide one for you.
- Closed captioning is available on the screen for all of our livestreamed and Cable TV services to assist those with hearing impairment.
- The pastors or communion servers will bring communion to you in your pew during communion distribution, if mobility is a challenge for you. Please let one of our ushers know if you would like communion brought to you in the pew.
- We offer multiple "virtual" worship options for those who are homebound, including our BOB-FM radio broadcast, Cable TV broadcast on Channel 6, and our livestream at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.
- We know that standing can be difficult for some. That is why we say "Please stand in body or in spirit." Please feel free to remain seated in your pew if this is more comfortable for you. We know that you are standing in spirit!
- All of our restrooms throughout the building are accessible and are marked with blue "Accessible" signs.
- ONE TIP: Our Adams Street parking lot (on the corner of 3rd and Adams Street) has several spaces for those with disabilities, and door #4 from the Adams Street lot is completely accessible—no steps or elevator are needed to access the Sanctuary from this parking lot.

May our Church home always be a place where all are welcomed and all may experience the love and grace of Jesus in and through this place we call Zion Lutheran Church.

a personal reflection

The Sound of Silence

It's telling of my age when I mention that Simon and Garfunkel's music helped to shape me in my tender years. Recently, while listening to one of my favorites—*The Sound of Silence*, I was compelled to pull up the lyrics written by Paul Simon. It begins with:

Hello darkness, my old friend, I've come to talk with you again,

Because a vision softly creeping, left its seeds while I was sleeping,

And the vision that was planted in my brain, still remains within the sound of silence.*

It continues to tell of a dystopian existence, where people are isolated and lonely in their silence and that the only light that can penetrate their darkness is a neon god they made. In the book <u>Celebration of Discipline</u>, author Richard Foster writes about Christian disciplines, one of which is solitude. Solitude, he explains is an essential practice of listening for God in silence. Foster continues, "Of necessity, therefore, we must come to understand and experience the transforming power of silence if we are to know solitude." Jesus practiced solitude regularly. For instance, following the feeding of the 5,000 he "went up on the mountain by himself to pray." (Matthew 14:23) For Jesus, it was imperative that he set aside time away from his disciples and the crowds. He did not experience silence as the song suggests, in an isolated or lonely way, but rather he used his self-imposed solitude to better understand his Father's will through prayer and contemplation. As for us, in the busyness of life and with the distractions that selfishly demand our attention, it is difficult to hear God's voice. So, we too need to be intentional in our silence and solitude by carving out a time and place that is conducive for prayer and meditation. In Psalm 37:7 David encourages us to "be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him." Finally, something to ponder—If you were to write your own lyrics to this song, would you tell of Christ as the only light that can penetrate our darkness?

From the Zion EcoFaith Team

Ahhh, a new year! The time to start fresh, to make New Year's resolutions with the intent of becoming a better version of yourself. Does this sound like you? No? Me, neither! Not that I don't need fixing, far from it. But nothing like the present to fix what I think needs fixing, I always say.

BUT, what about resolving to better care for our God-created, earthly home? God formed such a perfect environment for us to live and thrive in, and now it's hurting in so many ways due to neglect and short-sightedness. Thankfully, there are actions each of us can take to care for the land, air and water that we and all other creatures need. So, in the spirit of the New Year, I resolve to:

- be better at examining how an item is packaged and make my purchasing decision from that. Is the packaging material easily recyclable, like paper? Or is much of it plastic, which most likely go in the garbage/landfill? Do I even need this item?
- be sure to always have a reusable food storage container or two in my car. Take-home containers that restaurants typically provide are throw-away containers.

Here are some New Year's resolution suggestions to get you started; perhaps they'll lead you to other creation-friendly ideas:

- Plan ahead and combine trips when doing your errands and follow the posted speed limit.
- If you haven't already, reconsider how you approach the Reuse-Reduce-Recycle mantra. Aim more of your efforts to Reusing and Reducing.
- Use reusable shopping bags; you'll be amazed at how much they hold! If you're already doing this, then add reusable produce bags.
- Reduce your current meat consumption by 1-2 meals weekly.
- Reduce food waste with better meal planning; join your local organics recycling program if you haven't already.
- Take Navy showers. Where else can your household reduce water usage?
- Use programmable thermostats and LED lights; contact your local utility company for more energy-saving initiatives.
- Make your own homemade all-purpose cleaners simple, effective, inexpensive, and no more having to get rid of another piece of plastic!
- Plant native trees and native pollinator plants; install a rain barrel and create a rain garden.
- And if you're really committed, join the no-waste movement!
