Zion Foundation Grants

Helping Good Things Grow

- Lutheran Legacy

Grants are available to community organizations as well as Zion's own ministries and programs. To qualify, an organization must be a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and have a sponsor who is a member of Zion. If your organization or ministry is doing work that helps make the world a better place, we invite you to learn more. Supporting the Next Generation of Leaders

The Zion Foundation believes in investing in people—and especially in those preparing for lives of service and leadership. Grants are available to Zion members attending an ELCA college or ELCA seminary.

- ELCA college students: \$500 per year. Most ELCA colleges match this grant with an additional \$500.
- ELCA seminary students: Up to \$1,000 per year.

pastor's corner



This Is the Day the Lord Has Made

My dad's birthday is August 17. When I was growing up, he used to tell us that he didn't like his birthday very much anymore. At first, I didn't get it. Who doesn't like their birthday? But as I got older, I began to understand. My dad's birthday came in the middle of August, just as summer was beginning to slip away. When we were young, he knew that his birthday meant that the beginning of the school year was just around the corner. Soon, his children would be heading back to school, and the long, carefree days of summer spent together would come to an end.

His birthday reminded him that time was passing.

August can feel that way. The days are still warm and the summer sun is still shining, but we begin to look ahead. School supplies appear in stores. Calendars fill with activities. At Zion, we begin preparing for a new program year—a year filled with possibilities, new opportunities, and new ways to grow together in faith. And this year, we have even more to look forward to as we welcome our new Director of Children's Ministry, Tim Stammeyer, and our new Director of Middle and High School Ministry, John Patton. Food For Thought

Spending part of the week over the July 4th holiday with our 5 young grandchildren and their parents, I was reminded how fortunate my family is when it comes to food security. Snacks for the car ride, snacks after nap, snacks for the parade, Snacks, snacks, snacks. If a snack request came too close to dinner time and was met with a firm “no”, the child would ask the grandparents. I saw that coming. Granted, the snack cupboard was brimming with nutritional items for the kids, at least until the deluge of parade candy entered the fray. And the meal planning was simple. Each family bought ingredients for one dinner and took over the preparation for the entire group, cutting down on too many cooks in the kitchen. This did not apply to the three dogs, however, whose collective goal was to be underfoot anytime there was food involved. My point being, there was never a question amongst my family members as to where we would find the money to buy groceries to feed 11 people.

When we arrived home from our time together, there was a mailing from ACBC (Anoka County Brotherhood Council) in my box. Included was a thank-you to all supporters and a plea to do more. We can all attest to the phenomenal increase in food costs, not to mention the rising cost of gas, utilities, rent etc. Many household incomes, in fact, have not kept up with these increases. Consider this statistic: From January to May of this year there has been a 30% increase in the number of individuals ACBC has fed compared to 2025.

In Acts 20:35b (ESV) the Apostle Paul preaches, “...remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, ‘It is better to give than to receive.’” In addition to the monetary and food donations that we send to ACBC, Zion is also providing up to 8 volunteers on Thursdays from 2-4 p.m. to pack food boxes. ACBC welcomes monetary and food donations anytime and you may sign up at the front desk to volunteer on a Thursday with others from Zion.

Super Sale Update

The 2026 Zion Super Sale was once again a huge success. We shared lots of joy and laughter throughout the week. Some of the accomplishments included: 187 volunteers giving 4,100 hours of their time (21 hours average); raising over \$30,000, \$6,000 more than last year, from over 900 shoppers, \$2,222 per sale hour; over \$500 more per hour than last year; and completing clean up within 3 hours with leftovers supporting ACBC, the Epilepsy Foundation and Goodwill. We look forward to seeing you at next year's sale June 6-11, 2027!

Summer Camp

Summer means camp season! This year, Zion sent 40 youth to Wapo Bible Camp. Scholarships were provided for every camper attending Seeds Camp and Camp Wapo, totaling nearly \$10,000 this summer alone.

Your generosity is always in motion—helping our youth grow in faith, build friendships, and experience God's love.

Coffee, Donuts, and Community

There is something holy about gathering around a cup of coffee and a donut on a Sunday morning.

It's where new members are welcomed, friendships are deepened, prayer requests are shared, and laughter is heard throughout the Cornerstone. It's where children proudly show off their Sunday school artwork, and where someone who walks through our doors feeling alone is reminded that they belong.

Of course, coffee doesn't magically appear in the pot, and donuts don't multiply in the boxes (although we wouldn't mind if they did!). Each year, the coffee, donuts, cakes for special celebrations, and all the supplies that make our hospitality ministry possible cost **\$9,393**—about **\$180.63 each week**. We continue to offer these treats with only a free will offering because we believe hospitality is part of who we are as a church. Everyone is welcome at the table.

Thank you for the ways your generosity keeps this ministry "brewing." The coffee may last only a few minutes, and the donuts disappear quickly, but the fellowship they nurture is truly priceless.

Your generosity is always in motion—sharing Christ's love in ways both seen and unseen.

Financial Contributions and Gifts in Kind

Through our General Fund, Zion gave **\$96,285 last year** in benevolence to the Minneapolis Area Synod, local service organizations, and our global missionaries and mission partners. Your generosity also provided **\$27,250** for our radio and cable broadcast ministries, helping share God's Word beyond the walls of our building.

But your generosity doesn't stop there.

In 2025, special offerings supported additional local partnerships and ministries, including the ACBC Thanksgiving Offering and the Caring Tree. Together, these gifts totaled **\$24,653**.

And then there are the gifts that continue to make a difference through the years. Many people have remembered Zion in their wills and memorial gifts. Through the Zion Foundation, those gifts helped provide **\$58,500 in grants last year** to support ministries and organizations locally and around the world.

And let's not forget the many ways Zion gives beyond financial gifts. Our ministries and members make countless **in-kind contributions**—from donations to the Zion Food Pantry and ACBC Food Shelf, to quilts, prayer shawls, Matthew Bags, and school supplies, snacks, and clothing for local schools.

Small Group Study Begins the Week of September 13

Our first fall study will continue our Bible study through the viewing of and discussion around *The Chosen*. We'll watch and discuss Season 5 this fall and then Season 6 in the spring of 2027. *The Chosen* is a dramatic video miniseries based on the Gospels, mostly drawing from Matthew and John. As a "drama," the series draws both from Scripture, at times word for word, while at other times imagining "what might have happened" or "what could have been going on" in the lives of those about whom we hear very little in the actual writing of those Scriptures. Drawing from both direct biblical context and historical background guided by consulted Biblical scholars (both Christian and Jewish) AND the creative imagination of the series producers, *The Chosen* has been a great way "to see" the Word. A number of our past *Chosen* participants have commented how their participation in our study series has enlivened the way they "see" and hear the Gospels on Sunday morning. ZAAM would again like to thank all who made the 'Recovering Peace' Conference a reality. We have so many things yet to learn and thankfully, there are so many professionals with a heart for teaching and supporting those with addictions and their families. ZAAM coordinates with the Recovery Cafe about once a month to watch informative talks relating to addiction.

Highlights from a recent webinar "How to Love Someone in Recovery" with author, Caroline Beidler, MSW; hosted by Pastor Ed Treat, Director of The Center of Addiction and Faith.

- What is recovery? How do I stay close without losing myself? Recovery starts with connection and fellowship.
- What Recovery Really is? It's more than stopping substances. It's physical, mental and emotional change. It's building a life worth staying for and finding purpose and giving back.
- One of the keys to loving someone in recovery is helping them say 'yes' to the good things, not just 'no' to the bad things. Ask someone in addiction, "What are your hopes in life?"

You are encouraged to download the free app for The Center of Addiction and Faith for resources, references, webinars, AA and Al-Anon meetings and so much more.

ZAAM is researching programs that offer training on 'Mental Health First Aid'. Watch for updates, programs and events sponsored by Zion and ZAAM. All are welcome on the third Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. each month for our meetings. Have a great, safe summer!
